

The Kiwanis Club of Washington, D.C. has a long and storied history in the District of Columbia and the Kiwanis International organization. It was the first club established in the District of Columbia, inspired by a visit to the Kiwanis Club of Buffalo, New York

in 1916. The first meeting was held in February 1917 at the Burlington Hotel, which was located at 1120 Vermont Ave NW (Thomas Circle). Other early meetings were held at The Ebbitt (now the Old Ebbitt Grill) and the Cochran Hotel (now the site of DC Coast at 14th & K Streets NW). On January 16, 1918, International President George M. Hixson delivered the charter, which bears the date May 19, 1917. (more information can be found on club website).

March 17-19, 2017, the 2017 Capital Kiwanis-Family District Convention "SERVICE Through the Ages" was held in Baltimore, Maryland. Three conventions running simultaneously... WOW. I hope those of you who attended had a wonderful experience. Countless hours of planning went into

Kiwanis baseball preparing for its 72nd season

STAUNTON - World War II was just ending, and four service clubs in the Staunton area felt that, coming out of the hardships of the previous five years, area youngsters deserved something beneficial.

It was the summer of 1945 and youth baseball in the Staunton area was born when the Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions and Young Men's Civic Club joined together to form the first league. The following year, the Staunton Kiwanis Club took over, and when registrations for the 2017 season begin Monday night, it will be the 72nd consecutive year of youth baseball sponsored by the club.

Over the years, things have changed, except basically the game rules are the same. At its onset, teams took names like the Termites and Woodpeckers. The rosters were staffed by youngsters from certain sections of town, like Sears Hill, Selma and West End. The first games were played at the fairgrounds ball field, where the Staunton Braves now play. And it was an older group of youngsters, usually around age 13 that formed the teams. By the 1950s, play was in the main area of Gypsy Hill Park, generally where it is today, and there were leagues for younger players.

For many years, the program was independent. But in 1984, Staunton joined Babe Ruth Baseball, a national program it continues in today.

All-star teams from the Staunton program have advanced to a pair of Babe Ruth Bambino World Series, and have won numerous Southeast Region and Virginia state titles.

Over the years, the Kiwanis program has seen two of its players make the major leagues, Jerry May with the Pittsburgh Pirates and Larry Sheets with the Baltimore Orioles.

Who knows who may be next, but the first step takes place Monday night when registration begins from 6-8 p.m. and runs each evening through Friday at the Staunton Recreation and Parks Office in Montgomery Hall Park.

The current program has leagues for all youngsters age 4-12 based on a May 1 birth date. The 4-year olds play an

elementary T-ball known as Blastball. Regular T-Ball is for those 5-6, Rookie League off the pitching machine for 7-8, Junior League for 9-10 and Cal Ripken League for 11-12. There is some variation on ages and leagues depending on a player's ability.

Parents may also volunteer at the registration for everything from coaching to scoring or serving as team mothers. Staunton is just one of 10 local leagues in the Babe Ruth program, and all are gearing up for the 2017 season.

And each year, come new rules. The most significant one this season is using pitch counts in tournament play. Already, some leagues have adopted pitch counts for the regular season and used them in the past.

The purpose, of course, is to prevent overuse of young arms. Studies have shown that it is in youth baseball where the first problems with arms begin, and it's primarily from overuse. Also, some programs, particularly Little League, are gearing up to change the age determination date. Currently, all programs use May 1. But Little League, for the 2019 season, plans to move its determination date to August 31.

This will prevent anyone who has turned 13 from participating in the Little League World Series. This has become a problem in the past where 6-foot plus 13-year-olds are playing on the Little League's 60-foot diamond. Babe Ruth has made it clear that it will not change its age determination date

from May 1. One of the reasons is that in its 12-under division most of the leagues have gone from 60-foot to the larger 70-foot diamond which accommodates the growing youngster.

In 2016, of the 216 chartered 12-under major teams in the state, 177 were playing on the 70-foot diamond and only 39 on the 60-foot. In this area's District 4, only two of 10 leagues utilized 60-foot diamonds at the 12-under level last year.

The recent warm days are a hint that the youth season is just around the corner. High schools begin spring practice Monday, and local colleges and universities are already into their baseball season.

Baltimore's Inner Harbor was the site of the 99th Annual Capital District Kiwanis Convention last month and unlike most years, it was held in conjunction with the Capital District Key Club and CKI Conventions as well. Over 1200 members of the Kiwanis-Family converged on the Sheraton Inner Harbor and Hyatt Regency Baltimore hotels for a weekend of education, fellowship, the celebration of past achievements and the election of new district officers. Kiwanis International Trustee and counselor to the Capital District Bert West and his wife Sandy, were on hand to bring greetings to the delegation from the KI Board of Trustees.

The weekend kicked off with both the District Board of Trustees and the Capital District Kiwanis Foundation Board holding meetings on Friday along with a number of pre-convention workshops including Club Leadership Education training for incoming presidents and secretaries.

The convention theme of "Service Through The Ages" was on full display during Friday night's 80's-themed Murder Mystery Dinner. The Murder Mystery Company of Baltimore theater troupe was on hand for a private performance for the attendees

where it turned out the Kiwanis Club of Washington, D.C. member and District Risk Manager April Gassler was the killer. Oh, the irony!

Saturday's Opening Breakfast included an incredibly personal address from Make-A-Wish Mid-Atlantic Volunteer Coordinator Stephanie Feinberg, who served a Key Club Lt. Governor here in Capital during her high school years and is now a member of the Kiwanis Club of Bethesda.

Following breakfast, there were a full slate of Kiwanis educational workshops available to attendees before the Kiwanis-Family Luncheon. All attendees from the three concurrent conventions came to the Baltimore Convention Center, for perhaps the largest single Capital District event ever. Keynote Speaker Kevin Wanzer was on-hand with his Aloha spirt to provide everyone with laughs, thoughts on how to be spread the mission of Kiwanis to more individuals and of course, kazoos!

Over twenty exhibitors were on-hand for the attendees to learn more about service projects, charities and Kiwanis partners. The Ducky Derby and Caring Corning raised \$11,100 for the District Foundation and the CDKF would

like to thank everyone who donated a basket and bought raffle tickets.

The Governor's Gala on Saturday night was an opportunity to hear from Governor Kelly Boswell on the good work we have done so far in our communities with a reminder that there is still a lot ahead of us before the Kiwanis year ends on September 30. Kiwanians were also treated to the comedy hypnotism of Marshal Manlove who put on a hysterical show for the adults after wowing the Key Club and CKI members the night before.

Two resolutions were passed unanimously providing support for Kiwanis International Trustee Art Riley on his campaign for International Vice President and a memorial resolution and touching tribute was given by Past International Trustee Jerry Peuler on the passing of District Secretary Emeritus Ellis Stoup in May of 2016.

Governor-Designate Rife introduced his District Committee Chairpersons and performed the installation of 2017-18 Class of Lt. Governors on Sunday morning during the Inspirational Breakfast. He, then, closed out the convention with an encouraging message about how we will build on the successes of The Formula to strengthen our existing clubs and provide more service through the expansion of Kiwanis into new communities.

Our 100th Annual Capital District Kiwanis Convention will take place at the Hyatt Regency Reston Hotel in Reston, Virginia the weekend of August 17-19, 2018.

- Carl Sandburg Middle School Builders Club held a towel and sheet drive for animals.

Over the past year, clubs have reached milestone anniversaries and we have even added new clubs. Dream Big: Focus on Opening New Clubs

First, I want to thank each member who attended DCON in Baltimore. The District Convention Committee had a difficult undertaking in planning the convention with Key Club and CKI. The convention had exciting events, educational workshops, and inspiring speakers! I certainly enjoyed the convention events and beautiful Baltimore.

We have six months left in Governor Kelly's term as she works towards her goals of recruiting club openers and club coaches in each of our 17 Divisions. As I stated at DCON, my focus for my term as Governor is to open seven clubs!

Capital District Kiwanians will have to DREAM BIG! I want us to FOCUS and working hard and have plenty of FUN doing so. I decided to name my leadership team the "Rife Stuff," based on the 1979 book by Tom Wolf, which told the story of the early space program. I want us to dream big dreams and accomplish our goals. I want us to increase membership. The Capital District has not opened seven new clubs in a single year in more than 25 years. Last year, the Kiwanis Club of Grundy opened the first new club in a small community named Hurley in Buchanan County! Division 17 in Southwest VA opened the only new club in 2016! We started visiting and building community support

several months earlier, visited schools, and spoke with teachers, principals, and other community leaders. The Kiwanis Club of Hurley was officially chartered March 28, 2016. The new club's first project was a successful food box drive for elementary school children; they are presently hoping to plan a fall festival to celebrate the area's Appalachian heritage. The members are so excited! I challenge you to get excited, get motivated, and start creating community interest in a new Kiwanis Club!

The Leadership team for 2017-2018 met at DCON, exchanged great ideas and discussed goals, strategies, and tactics. I want to share those with all Capital District Kiwanians. Our goal is to open seven new clubs and build a membership network for the Capital District. My Strategy is to have each Region open one club. Division 17, my home Division, will open two clubs in my term. My other goal of building a membership network is to have each Division have one club opener and two club coaches. We must allocate proper resources and training for the club openers and coaches. This is a step-by-step process and will not happen overnight. With focus and commitment, we can grow our membership. We have not had a membership gain since 2006, when Warren Kane was Capital District



Governor. Finally, the tactic is that each Trustee will be a Regional Formula Coordinator under the direction of District Chair Missy Zimmerman. They will work closely with their LTGs to insure each division has one club opener and two club coaches.

We have gone from 10,066 members in 1990 to 4605 in 2016. Our club count has dropped from 225 in 1990 to 146 clubs in 2016. We have to adjust to the change in community conditions and focus on increasing membership. Our service work with our kids on the community level and our global projects are so important. It is my honor to belong to Kiwanis International!

Delegates to vote on bylaw amendments

Attendees at the 2017 Kiwanis International convention will vote on proposed amendments to the Kiwanis International Bylaws. Among the proposals that have been submitted:

- To remove the limitation that only one person from a district may serve on the Kiwanis International Board at the same time. (Submitted by the Kiwanis Club of Springfield-Downtown, Illinois, USA.)
- To provide for candidate nominations and initial review of proposed amendments and resolutions at the Kiwanis International convention, with final voting permitted to take place online. (Submitted by the Capital District Board.)
- To remove the provision that allows criminal history background checks conducted by districts to be considered equivalent to those conducted by Kiwanis International. (Submitted by the Kiwanis International Board.)

Collectively, we managed to raise over \$2,100.00!!!



Joe Richard McCray

"To be heroic may mean nothing more than this, to stand in the face of the status quo, amidst the madness of an increasingly chaotic world and represent another way"

For Joe Richard McCray, Kiwanis represented another way. Joe Richard joined the Kiwanis Club of Eastern Branch, Washington, DC/MD on October 16, 1970 and would become club President three years later. He was a Kiwanis International Life member but never showed off the gold-plated membership card that symbolized his status.

During 1999- 2000 Joe Richard represented Division One under Governor Gus Lamond as a member of the Millennium Falcons LTG class. Joe Richard was a Kiwanis subject matter expert who knew and understood International and District bylaws and policies. No matter the setting he was going to make certain Robert's Rules of Order were observed.

He loved to travel to conventions and mid-winter conferences and build friendships with members from all over the Capital District and the world. The 1987 convention in Washington, DC was one he spoke of often where in the House of Delegates he chose to speak in favor of admitting women. He described it as pivotal and one of the

best decisions Kiwanis ever made. He was Capital District Foundation Life member #77 and Founder's Society #50. At the International Foundation level (now Children's Fund) Joe Richard was a Diamond 8 Hixson, Hixson Ambassador, Tablet of Honor and a 21st Century Heritage Society member. If you visit Kiwanis International in Indianapolis you can find his brick outside the main entrance.

On June 25th he will be interned at Arlington National Cemetery. That day he will perform his last act of community service having made arrangements to pay for dinner for the soldiers who present his military honors.

He also honored several individuals including his wife Gertrude who he recognized with an international Tablet of Honor as well when she departed this life. Because of his generosity during the IDD worldwide service project, Eastern Branch was recognized with a Kiwanis International Honor banner which is a rare honor even today. "




Joe Richard believed so much in the mission of our foundations that he included them in his estate planning.

Whenever possible he recruited/ sponsored new members. It didn't matter what club they joined just that they added to our ranks. Joe Richard was a friend and mentor to members, club, division, district and international officers.

In 2015, Joe Richard celebrated his 45 year Legion of Honor anniversary as a member. On January 8th, Joe Richard was finally reunited with his wife, Gertrude. On June 25th he will be interned at Arlington National Cemetery. That day he will perform his last act of community service having made arrangements to pay for dinner for the soldiers who present his military honors.

His legacy remains beyond the call.
